Attention Voters: General Election - Tuesday, November 5, 2024 Check your Voter Registration Online!

The November 5 General Election is underway! Presidential elections typically draw out a larger turnout of first-time and infrequent voters, so the Pima County Recorder's Office wants to make sure voters aren't surprised at the polls regarding what type of ballot they're issued.

The Recorder's Office recommends that every voter [check their voter registration](#) to ensure that it's accurate and up to date before any election.

Ballots to Military and Overseas Voters were sent on September 21, and Early Voting begins on Wednesday, October 9. Here's how voters can prepare themselves for the upcoming election when they cast their ballots.

How do I register and what's the deadline?

First-time voters don't have a lot of time left to register. The deadline to register for the November 5 General Election is Monday, October 7. The Pima County Recorder's Downtown Office at 240 N Stone will be open until 10 pm on October 7 for voters to register in person. Submitted forms must be postmarked or submitted online by 11:59 pm on that date.

Registered voters who need to change their legal name, address, party affiliation or how they receive their ballot should submit a new Voter Registration form.

Voters with an Arizona driver's license or state ID can register or update their registration online at servicearizona.com.

Registration forms are available at Pima County public libraries, post offices, city and town halls, political party headquarters or Recorder's Offices. A list of locations can be found on our website.

Don't have an AZ ID? Go to our website recorder.pima.gov/Register to find other options to submit Proof of Citizenship and Proof of Residency with your AZ Voter Registration form.

Am I eligible to vote?

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To be eligible to participate, voters must:

- Reside in Pima County at least 29 days before the General Election
- Be a United States Citizen
- Be at least 18 on Election Day
- Have their rights restored if they are a convicted felon
- Not been adjudicated an incapacitated person

Military and Overseas voters can register and request a ballot until 7 pm on Election Day, Tuesday, November 5. The Pima County Recorder's Office must receive the voted ballot and Ballot Affidavit by 7 pm, Tucson time to be an eligible ballot. Overseas and military voters can see whether they qualify at recorder.pima.gov/MilitaryOverseasVoterInfo.

How does Early Voting work?

Voting by Mail

Early Ballots will automatically be mailed to voters who are signed up for the Active Early Voting List (AEVL) starting Wednesday, October 9. Mail Ballots will also be sent to voters who have submitted a one-time Early Ballot Request through our online portal or by phone throughout the Early Voting period, as those requests continue to be received. The deadline to request an Early Ballot by mail is Friday, October 25.

Ballots can be sent to a temporary location by request via the online form at recorder.pima.gov/BallotByMail and select "I would like my ballot sent to a different address." Sign up for text or email alerts to track your ballot and to receive alerts about changes you make to your voting record at recorder.pima.gov/AlertMe.

By federal law, ballots cannot be forwarded through the mail. Postal holds and forwarding services will result in a returned ballot and could delay your ballot.

Voting Early, In-Person

Early In-Person Voting will begin on Wednesday, October 9 and continue through Friday, November 1. Emergency Voting will be available on Saturday, November 2 and Monday, November 4. The times, dates and locations are available at recorder.pima.gov/EarlyVotingSites.

To facilitate voter convenience and accessibility, our 19 sites will open in three phases:

- October 9 – Select sites will be open to the public
- October 21 – Additional sites become operational
- October 28 – All remaining sites are available to voters

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Our office must receive ballots by 7 pm on Election Day, Tuesday, November 5. We recommend they be mailed back no later than October 29. They can also be dropped off at any Early Voting Site or on Election Day at any Vote Center.

How do I know the mail I'm receiving is really from the Recorder's Office?

Mail from our office will always say that it's from the Pima County Recorder's Office and has our logo. If you received a blue postcard from us, NO RESPONSE IS NEEDED, by law we are required to notify a voter anytime their Voter Registration changes. If you would prefer to receive an email or text alert about changes you make to your voting record sign up at recorder.pima.gov/AlertMe.

If you receive mail for someone who does not live in your household, please legibly mark the piece and return it via mail. Please note we will send a forwardable piece of mail that should also be returned if received. This begins a legal inactivation process that will stop mail from being sent to your address for that voter.
