Recorder's Office: Business as usual, voters receiving ballots

In response to voters' questions about the SAVE America Act and President Trump's Executive Order regarding the U.S. Postal Service: The Recorder's Office has not been informed of any changes made by the U.S. Post Office that will impact mail ballots in the July 21 Arizona Primary Election. The Recorder's Office is already receiving early ballots from many enthusiastic voters, and no delays have been reported.

Ballots were mailed out from Tucson on Wednesday, June 24. Voters in the metro areas should receive their ballots within two to three days, rural areas should see them in five to seven days. Please visit the [Voter Dashboard](#) or contact the Recorder's Office to ensure that your ballot is sent to your address. Those voters who are No Party Designated or "Independent" must either select the party's ballot they want or choose to vote a City/Town only ballot, if eligible. July 10 is the deadline to request a primary ballot by mail. Please visit our website for more details.

Concerns about delays or federal interference with mail voting are the result of a March 21, 2026, Executive Order. A federal court ruling on June 25, 2026, [blocked enforcement of that Executive Order](#).

The ruling stated that the president did not have the constitutional authority to regulate state elections, and that the federal government could not use the postal system to regulate who gets ballots. The latter ruling refers to a rule-change proposal by the USPS in order to comply with the Executive Order. The proposal is still listed on the [Federal Registrar's website](#), and public comments are still being accepted.

The Arizona Secretary of State and the Arizona Attorney General are signed onto a lawsuit contesting the Executive Order.

The Pima County Recorder's Office will continue to monitor any legal or legislative changes and communicate with the U.S. Post Office to keep voters informed about any developments or changes regarding voting options.
